The Black Headed Gull

Scientific name: Chroicocephalus ridibundus

Black-headed gulls are the most common inland gull and can be seen all year round.

Black-headed gulls are sociable, quarrelsome, noisy birds, usually seen in small groups or flocks, often gathering into larger parties where there is plenty of food, or when they are roosting.

In the 19th century blackheaded gulls were quite rare and were hardly ever seen inland. Now, they are the most common inland gull species found throughout the country.
