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Food for thought

How is Sailing affected by Sexism in Racing By Elizabeth Valentine

Introduction

For many years I have been sailing and thoroughly enjoyed all aspects of the wonderful sport. When I first started my research, there was a lot on the news about sexism and the idea came to me to combine my favourite sport to see how much sexism there is in sailing. I was surprised.

You always think that it is not that bad. However, what I intend to highlight is that so much more can be done about this topic.

The Race Around the World

It is often thought that the first man to sail around the world was Ferdinand Magellan. In September 1519, he set sail from Spain in fleet of five ships to sail around the world, returning three years later. His achievement is still celebrated today, even though he got into a battle in the Philippines over new claimed territory where they could source spices. Unfortunately, he did not survive the terrible battle, however some of his crew did, including their new captain, Juan Sebastián Elcano. They then went on and finished the sail around the world.

Elcano received recognition of his achievement by the Emperor Charles V with the coat of arms reading "primus circumededisti me" meaning "first to circumnavigate me."

Unfortunately, it took 250 years before a woman sailed around the world, Jeanne Baret. She set sail on the 1766 and returned 1769. Baret was a member of Louis Antoine de Bougainville's expedition on the ships La Boudeuse and Étoile. At the time France was looking to expand their economy and funded multiple expeditions around the world. Jeanne wanted to be the first French person and woman to sail around the world, but for her to do so, she disguised her appearance as a male botanist looking for plants so her shipmates did not know that she was a woman.

Women at Sea

Women were said to bring bad luck on board because they distracted the sailors from their sea duties. This kind of behaviour angered the seas which meant that they would take their revenge out on the ship. Conversely, naked women were completely welcome. This is because a naked woman would calm the seas. Because of this, ships typically have a figurehead of a topless woman perched on the bow of the ship. The woman's bare breasts shamed the stormy seas into calm waters and her open eyes guided the men to safety.

Competing Against Women

There has been a lot of resistance over the years to allow women to directly compete versus men. A survey was sent to 4,500 sailors in Ireland in 2020 and found that 71% of women in age bracket 25 to 35 years old, have experi-

enced gender discrimination. Twenty percent of people over 30 years of age have been in an incident of harassment. "I have been sexually harassed and assaulted by my male bosses and crew mates in the sailing industry" commented one of the 21-year-old women in the report.

It seems strange that this is the case, as sailing has the privilege of being one the few sports where men and women can compete on a relatively even basis across a wide range of classes, as proven by Mr and Ms Elvstrom racing their Tornado together in the 1984 Olympics.

Ellen MacArthur is another example, she was one of the few female sailors to insist on competing on an equal basis rather than leverage her obvious marketability to create a female team, preferring to 'beat up on' the guys at their own game, either on her own or as part of a mixed crew.

How is it now?

I believe that sexism is a thing that occurs in sailing, however, I have found that women are also part of the problem. I am not saying that men don't do anything wrong, as I have seen many sites saying stuff like 75 years and only 10% are women in sailing. So, men are defiantly part of it too, pushing women away, when instead they should be inviting them in.

However, there are many female sailor only sites which everyday post posts being horrible about men. I don't believe that this should be part of the sailing community when we are striving to achieve a 50/50 split. Even though men are being mean to women we should try to fight with kindness instead of evil.

What Ellen MacArthur has done for women in sport is destroy one persistent myth that has always condemned females as less worthy of coverage, public interest, prize money and most importantly, the funding they need to pursue their aims.

In 2021, female athletes raced alongside the men for the first time at the sixth event of SailGP Season 2 in Cadiz, Andalusia on Saturday, and Sunday.

The Future

Since 2017, there has been a number of prominent breakthroughs in women's sailing – not least the introduction of a new quota system in the Volvo Ocean Race, which will favour yachts that go for a mixed crew. My hope is that this is the start of a trend that will pick up momentum and see our sport continuing to make fundamental changes to increase opportunities based on talent rather than gender.

Conclusion

Historically women have been very restricted in what they could do, over the ages they have been restricted to needlepoint, singing and mundane tasks. It's good to see that sailing is evolving - this is highlighted when you consider that the first man sailed around the world nonstop by himself in 1968 whereas the first woman was in 1988, 20 years later.

It is great to see that this is changing, however there is more than can be done.

It is interesting to see the shift in recent times as more and more races are opening up to gender equality and a variety of sailors are now speaking out. I am excited to see what the future holds for the sailing community.




KNOTS AND THEIR USES

The Bowline



The bowline is used to make a loop at one end of a line. It is tied with the rope's working end also known as the "tail" or "end". The loop may pass around or through an object during the making of the knot. The knot tightens when loaded at (pulled by) the standing part of the line.

The bowline is commonly used in sailing small craft, for example to fasten a halyard to the head of a sail or to tie a jib sheet to a clew of a jib. The bowline is well known as a rescue knot for such purposes as rescuing people who might have fallen down a hole, or off a cliff onto a ledge. This knot is particularly useful in such a situation because it is possible to tie with one


