So, in 2017 I took my RYA Day Skipper. It was a great experience and the examiner looked in my log book a little more, interested in what I had been up to as relief crew on sail training ships.

They encouraged me to do my Yachtmaster Exam. So, me being me, rising to a challenge I thought I would do the Yachtmaster Theory. Well, this proved to be a challenge in itself.

With work time away on ships and finding time in life's rich tapestry of challenges, I eventually found time to finish it off. By January 2019 I was on it!! Fired up raring to do my practical.

No one really knows the difficulty and nature of this exam. So, even doing an intense prep week and training beforehand, it became evident that actually, I was nowhere near as ready as I should have been.

So, I put number 1 exam down to training and experience and thought I needed to up my game! After some more sailing and training, I thought that September 2022 was my time for another try.

With all the instruction and extra trips under my belt I booked up another prep week and off I went. Sailing off into the sunset I was not delegating as I should, Crash Gybed and yes failed because of it.

I put this exam down to my lack of delegating and experience of being in charge of the boat. Back to more training, picking up more tips and then, finally going for it in March 2023.

Well it all went very well... except... my passage plan needed more details for the examiner to pass me.

So, I went away with an action plan of 6 weeks to put a passage plan together and a Zoom meeting to discuss the results.

One other thing, one of my passages didn't count the distance (no one picked up on this). So, finally YES!! I passed my Yachtmaster Coastal.

One more step for my offshore qualification to do another non stop 60 mile plus passage... Well, no matter what sailing experience you have this is a real toughy to achieve.

KIRSTEN NEUSCHÄFER WINS GOLDEN GLOBE RACE.

Her win makes history as the first female skipper ever to win a solo round the world race.

The Golden Globe Race is inarguably one of the toughest sporting events in existence and the skill she demonstrated throughout, places Kirsten firmly alongside the greats of ocean racing.

In 1966, British yachtsman Francis Chichester set out from England to sail solo round the world setting the challenge going for a race sailing solo non-stop around the globe.

By offering a trophy for the first person to sail solo non-stop around the world via the five great capes and a £5000 prize for the fastest time, the Sunday Times Paper created an instant race and a great story.

In 1968, nine colourful characters with varying sailing skills headed off at various times in a strange collection of yachts.

Today's GGR challenges sailors to have no modern means of navigation and just to use the traditional methods of navigating with sextant RDF (Radio direction Finding), and old-fashioned charts,

to sail non-stop around the world.

The boats that compete are made/designed no later than 1988, and are no longer than 38ft long.

There is a wind vain steering gear to aid the crew member.

This year, there were 16 taking part, 233 days later there 5 are left and only 3 qualified for the race. The other 2 stopped for repairs.

1 boat sunk completely; another is floating around the Indian ocean still after being severely damaged by a 'knock down' (Yacht capsize).

If you have followed it, the race has been really exciting, especially towards the end where 3 boats finished just with hours between them after all that distance.

Very skilful sailing by all participants and a well done to the first woman to ever achieve this win.
