Chief Instructor's Report

Castlemead School

On Monday & Tuesday 25th & 26th June we ran two days for Castlemead Junior school with a total of 47 year 5 students across the two days. We sailed two-up in Toppers and essentially followed the RYA OnBoard syllabus for these sessions. In practice this means giving the students a brief run through on-shore of how to tack the boat, how it steers and what to do if you capsize. Once they have all had a go at dry land tacking drill, it's on to the water! We set out a square of buoys so contain the sailors, with the buoys allowing beam reaches across between two of the buoys and asked the students to try and stay in the square. In the afternoons, we played some games in the boats; these included chasing our trusty ducks around inside the square and collecting tennis balls from a bucket tied to one of the buoys

and delivering them to a safety boat. Monday afternoon was quite gusty and we took the rigs off of the boats and used paddles instead. We then had a great game of boat-ball - like football, but passing the football from boat to boat within a count of three and scoring between two buoys set out as "goalposts". We had a great couple days with our visiting sailors and have had a few enquiries about joining the club as a result. I would like to give my thanks to all of those that volunteered help over these two days. These were: Alex Llewelyn, Lily Swerdlow, Poppy Thornton, Peter Barnes, Molly Savva, Verity Brewerton, Karen Gibson, Steve Winter & Oli Welbourn. Five Essentials—Daggerboard & Centreboard

Following from our start along the five-essentials pathway last edition, this month we are going to consider the use of the daggerboard and centreboard as the third of our journey through the five-essentials. So, this is pretty straightforward, isn't it? Perhaps not quite as simple as one might initially think. Firstly, let us remind ourselves the function of the daggerboard or centreboard (the difference is that a daggerboard moves vertically up and down whilst a centreboard is pivoted). The dagger/centreboard is there to prevent the boat slipping sideways and making too much leeway. The closer to the wind we are sailing, the further down the dagger/centreboard needs to be. When sailing to windward (beating) then it should be all the way down to project maximum area under the hull of the boat. As we turn away from the wind (bear away) then the dagger/centreboard can be lifted up, more and more as we bear away. Once on a run, the dagger/centreboard should be at its highest of any point of sailing, but it should never be completely raised as you always need some projection in order to steer the boat. As the wind increases, however, we need to make further adjustments. When it is sufficiently windy such that you are overpowered when sailing to windward, the dagger/centreboard may be raised a little to allow a little more leeway and hence relieve the pressure from the rig, additionally as the boat speed increases it needs less dagger/centreboard to maintain a straight course. The ultimate here is with high-performance trapeze boats which plane upwind; the crew in these boats will use the centreboard or rather how much it is down to control the boat balance once the rig is powered up and maximum righting moment is being exerted by the helm and crew. Similarly, sailing down a windy run requires more dagger/centreboard down than a light wind run. The dagger/centreboard in this case helps stabilise the boat and helps prevent the death roll that some boats are really prone to. Likewise on a reach, as the wind increases and the boat starts to plane, less dagger/ centreboard is needed.

Hopefully in this piece I have shown you that positioning of the dagger/centreboard is one of the vital components in controlling the boat as well as sailing it as fast as possible in a range of wind conditions.

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Youngest Sailor to circumnavigate globe

Dutch girl, 16, becomes youngest sailor to circumnavigate globe single-handed

Laura Dekker cheered into final harbour of St Maarten but may not return to Netherlands after government resistance to trip



Laura Dekker, a 16-year-old Dutch sailor who has become the youngest person ever to circumnavigate the globe single-handed, has threatened never to return to the Netherlands because of the government's resistance to her adventures.

Dekker arrived on the Caribbean island of St Maarten on Saturday aboard her 38ft boat, Guppy, and admitted she sometimes wondered what she was doing during her voyage. She also described her battles with the Dutch authorities, who wanted to prevent her setting sail, as a frightening and traumatic experience and said she was discussing with her parents the possibility of moving abroad, most likely to New Zealand.

When Dekker sailed into harbour at the St Maarten yacht club late on Saturday night, aged 16 years and 123 days, she was met by crowds of wellwishers and stepped on to the dock accompanied by her mother, Babs Muller, her father, Dick Dekker, and her sister and grandparents. "There were moments where I was like, 'What the hell am I doing out here?' but I never wanted to stop," she told reporters after struggling against high seas and heavy winds on the final 41 day leg from Cape Town, South Africa. "It's a dream, and I wanted to do it."
