WINTER SAILING AND TRAINING

Last winter Margaret ran a series of winter training days based around preparing sailors for the pre-assessment day required before anyone over the age of 16 may train to become a dinghy instructor. This pre-assessment day should have been held on September 9th but due to the forecast lack of wind we have had to postpone until 28th October. The assessment has to be carried out by an experienced RYA Dinghy Trainer and we are very fortunate to have Richard Beardsley running this day for us.

I now want to start on the next cadre of trainee instructors including those that already hold Assistant Instructor (AI) certificates or those that would like to follow this route.

We will run a series of days, approximately once a month over the winter to both talk about the RYA approach to teaching people to sail (the RYA Method).

Whilst our current Al training covers all of the components required for assessment and award of the certificate, the element that we don't currently cover in any detail is how to organise and deliver a sailing session.

So that is what I will focus on over this winter.

We will also cover the Dinghy Instructor pre-assessment criteria as these make excellent teaching sessions with which to demonstrate and practice session organisation and teaching methods.

The dates are also in the diary section, but these are the planned sessions – subject, of course, to weather forecast and conditions.

Saturday 25th November 2023 SHORE: ways that people learn WATER: tacking, gybing, roll-tacking & roll-gybing.

Saturday 16th December 2023 SHORE: stages of learning WATER: tight circles drill and mark rounding.

Saturday 20th January 2024 SHORE: RYA EDICTS model WATER: man overboard, coming alongside.

Saturday 17th February 2024 SHORE: presentation & visual aids WATER: rudderless & centreboardless sailing.

Saturday 16th March 2024 SHORE: briefing & debriefing WATER: sailing backwards, followmy-leader.

Sessions will run from 12 noon until 3pm on these days.

Obviously, things might change a bit as we progress through, and we will recap at the start of each session as I understand that not everyone will be able to attend every session. We are so lucky to have such a vibrant membership with so many of our young sailors keen to progress along the instructor route. That is not to say that we don't have any over 18's keen on instruction, because we do. Everyone is incredibly valuable in delivering our programme of teaching.

AN EVENING WITH PIP HARE

So, on a rainy evening in October, I trekked over to Dauntsey's school to listen and meet up with Pip Hare. For those who haven't heard of her she is a solo sailor from the 2020 Vendee Globe Round the World Race, achieving this in 95 days 11 hours and 37 minutes.

She also holds 2 Guinness Book of Records for sailing the fastest round the Isle of Wight in 4 hrs 48 minutes and 38 seconds for a 60 ft boat and solo sailor, (and a woman at that).

Her evening was a speech on her experiences during the race, her upgrade of 'Medallia' her boat and how she first started out.

I remember her showing me around her boat in Poole in 2019 just before the 'Big Race', she had only her friends to support her and help her then.

She has come a long way since the Telegraph wrote an article on her and Medallia popped up to sponsor her. She has never looked back!

She started out at the age of 16 with an ambition to sail around the world. She didn't know how she would achieve this, but she knew she wanted to do it.

She sailed all sorts of boats crossing the Atlantic several times, she delivered boats and tried to get her foot in the door of a very male dominated world. As she grew up her ambition got stronger to achieve her dream.

Finally in 2018 she had the opportunity to borrow a very old IMOCA Class boat (used for the Vendee Globe Race).

Pip and her friends did it up and made it appropriate for the job and she set off.

Facing many challenges, she kept 15th place out of 31 yachts until her rudder needed replacing which she did between storms in the Southern Ocean, finally finishing 19th!

She now hopes to achieve far more in 2024. Keep an eye out for the updates on this race starting in September.

If you really want something, you dream of you can get it with hard work and resilience. It was a fab evening!
