Hi all, not sure I can say “our new Principal” any longer as the past 10 months or so have flown by since I took up the role of Principal.

But I am pleased to say we have had a very successful year and have seen many of our young volunteer’s progress. Equally our talented Assistant Instructors (AI’s) and Dinghy Instructors (DI’s) have been supportive of the regular weekly training sessions, taster days or other Club events. Some of the AI’s have received tuition either from Nigel or from the RYA at the Club. The winter training programme for AI’s and prospective AI’s is already in progress too and we hope some of our more experienced AI’s will progress and become DI’s in the forthcoming year. We are also exploring recruiting or training DI’s up to become SI’s too.

The Club has been supported in the background by Chris Wheeler and his team, many from the RC Boats, who have given up their time and have tirelessly maintained the Club and its assets throughout 2023. Without this work, the Association would not be able to function as well as it does and becoming Principal has opened my eyes to the sheer amount of work they put in. My thanks to each of you, but especially to you Chris. Thank you.

The dedicated committee has grown in number during 2023 but we still need people to come forward and help us to steer the Association in the right

direction. New ideas are always welcome so any new blood on the Committee will only help to strengthen us. There are some vacancies on the committee for named roles and these were publicised via an email Camilla sent in December. At the annual awards evening on the 19th January, we will be looking to fill these roles. Nominations are invited before the 3rd January. However, if you are just interested in joining the committee, why not come along and talk to one of us to find out what is involved.

During 2023 the committee welcomed Michele Bennett as Membership Secretary and Camilla Blakesley as Secretary. We have also managed to enlist the help of Keith Bennett as our IT guru who is helping us transition to a more modern IT platform which will make all our lives easier. This will lead to an enhanced website and media offering. Watch this space for more news as this develops in quarter 1.

The committee has been planning for the 2024 season and we are looking at what events we want to put on in addition to the regular training on week-nights. We have a 5 year plan and the committee are enablers to its successful delivery. We have already seen the move away from petrol outboard motors to one of the first clubs in the UK to be totally electric. We are moving to becoming as green as possible and are looking at lots of ways of achieving this.

Fundraising is a major part of how we can offer all the activities and training as well as maintain the upkeep of the club’s assets. We have been successful in many of our bids for grants this year and I wish to thank Juley our Commodore for her hard work in obtaining these grants.

One of the outcomes of the fundraising is we have been able to purchase 2 new RS Zests. These have been installed at the club and are ready for the 2024 season. This will give us more diversity and provide a more modern dinghy to sail.

At the end of 2023 our welfare officer Kiley Sterling has decided to step down from the role. Liz Ballinger will be taking up this role (subject to ratification at the AGM). I wish to thank Kiley for her time as welfare officer at the club and hope she continues to volunteer whenever she can.

Finally, I need to say a huge thank you to everyone who has contributed, however small, to the running of the club, be it as a volunteer, an instructor, making the tea, supporting an event or being on the committee. Without you we would not continue and be able to offer this fantastic facility to the young people of Wiltshire.



CHIEF INSTRUCTOR'S REPORT

We held the first of our winter training sessions on Saturday November 25th. Despite the lack of wind and extreme cold we had a great few hours on the water. The aim of these sessions is to continue to develop our assistant instructors and those that volunteer and would either like to progress to becoming an AI or simply wish to develop their skills. We had planned to run a session on tacking; its something we can all do pretty much OK but my idea was to take an element and ask some of the attendees (in rotation) to act as the "instructor" for the session and brief the students, run the session on the water and then debrief the students. As the wind was very light indeed, we decided to run sessions on roll-tacking, a technique that all of the students knew about but most had not actually done.

We asked for two volunteers to act as the first instructors for the session and James Cooper and Tom Jones bravely stepped up, briefed the group and then we went out on the water. James and Tom accompanied Camilla and I in the two safety boats to coach and also note what the "students" were

doing and make some notes for the debrief. We then had a change around on the water and Elizabeth Valentine and Willow Sterling took over as our instructors. Back on shore both sets of trainee instructors were asked to debrief the group.

The final wash-up for the day involved me picking up on some of the learning points, showing the students some visual ways of demonstrating roll-tacking in the classroom and enjoying a well-earned cuppa! Our next session is going to cover different learning and teaching styles so should be good fun as we use these to "teach" man overboard drill and tight circles around a boat. Sessions continue on January 20th 2024, February 17th 2024 and March 16th 2024. Let me know if you want to come and join us at any of these days.

FIRST AID COURSE: 24TH FEBRUARY 2024

WWYSA will be running a RYA First Aid course on Saturday 24th February from 9:00 to 4:00. This will be at the clubhouse on Station Road Westbury.

As a reminder you need a valid First Aid certificate if you are a DI or SDI. Certificates for RYA First Aid are valid for 3 years from the date of your last course.

All the 12 places have now been filled but I am aware there are other volunteers and instructors who need to renew their First Aid either before or during the 2024 season. An email was sent to all of the people concerned on the

15th November. If you are one of these people and need to renew your First Aid, please let me know and I can place you on the reserve list. We are currently not planning on running a further First Aid course during 2024 unless there is significant demand for it.

FUND RAISING

Exciting news - we have just been awarded 2 grants that we applied for! The first, from Mercers' Company Ltd., was awarded in November. Before construction of its floating harbour Bristol harbour geography required sailors to leave vessels 'shipshape and Bristol fashion' to keep their goods in tact.

Bristol harbour rise and fall of tide varied by more than 30ft at times between tides. Moored ships beached at low tide, so everything had to be secured and stowed well in a tidy fashion, to avoid damage.



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
